

546 Villagers voted on 25th January and chose 2 new Parish Councillors from the 5 nominated candidates.

Four of those candidates took up the Newsletter's offer of space in the last edition to make their case. Three of them went further and circulated pamphlets.

The result was decisive. Cllr Mrs Mary Feeney and Clir Doug Reed polled almost the same number of votes - some 65% each of those cast. Mr Buckmaster's ideas attracted some 30% of support with Dr Norman Kenyon, who opted not to publish a leaflet, pulling in 22%. Of Mr Matthews little is known, but he still polled 44 votes (8%).

There is a peculiar madness which threatens those who analyse election results. More so with this election, unique in the village's history - 2 seats, 5 candidates, a Council at the height of its mid-term popularity ... perhaps we can best gauge what most concerns our community by repeating some of the ideas and ideals which were on offer. We list extracts from the published material which highlights some of the areas where candidates saw room for improvement in the way your Council is run;

- ✓ We need more consultation, better communication, openness and flexibility ... to acknowledge ... people's honesty and commitment both to Elmswell and to facilities in the village.
- Problems which, according to the ... outcome of the Village Appraisal, really matter ... include lorry traffic, pavements, facilities and services for young people
- ✓ Ensuring value for money ... dissatisfaction over the very high parish precept (taken from the rates) ... there must be a lot of money in the coffers somewhere, but how much, what will it be used for ... focus on value, not just cost.
- ✓ The environment ... open spaces, planting trees, litter, noise, recycling

- ✓ Moving forward rather than repeatedly criticising what went before ... engaging and involving people and organisations rather than alienating them ... publishing fully and widely rather than to the minimum it can get away with ... operate with sensitivity, and, admit when it gets things wrong.
- ✓ Take the less confrontational middle ground and plan for the future.

The most obvious effect is on the income to the Newsletter. Without the background files, it is uncertain as to who owes for their advertising. We are in consultation with the Police towards the release of copies of certain files. In the meantime, please bear with us, and, when

an invoice arrives, please pay promptly. If the aim of the mischief was to close your Newsletter down, we trust that you will share our determination to ensure that, on your behalf, we continue.

Although many of those who have contacted us with messages of support are convinced that the Parish Council or Parish Councillors are at the root of this troublesome and vindictive attack, there has been no admission to that effect to date and the Association can make no comment on the allegations.

We remain fully co-operative with the Police in the hope of a speedy conclusion and secure in the knowledge that there has been neither fraud, nor dishonesty on the part of the Trustees.

ELMSWELL MILLENNIUM HISTORY GROUP

The History Group is keen to build up an *Oral History*, capturing the voices of Elmswell people recalling the past - the people and events of the village. With this in mind we invited *Dr Tessa Stone*, an experienced recorder of 'Oral Testimony' to speak to the group. *Dr Stone's* particular expertise on this subject comes from the work she did for her doctorate, which involved recording the memories of women who had served in the forces during the war. She spoke of the possible pitfalls and suggested certain techniques that will prove invaluable.

Oral testimony is a fairly recent branch of historical research and was originally dismissed by professional historians as unreliable and unscientific. Conventionally history was written from the 'top, down', concentrating on royalty and the 'better sort.' However, oral history is now accepted as a serious subject and a legitimate way of giving the working class and minority groups a 'voice'.

Cruel to be Kind

Some time around 200 years ago an acorn germinated in a piece of ground just to the south of our village, in fact the area we now know as Kiln Meadow. At that time the area must have presented a very different aspect to the one we are familiar with. No, it wasn't a pristine piece of rural England, in fact probably far from it, for this area was, as the name implies, the heart of a significant industrial complex turning out white "Suffolk Bricks". Be that as it may, our tiny oak flourished and grew. At some unknown point in time, perhaps when the tree was about 50 years old, someone cut its top off, at about 7 foot above the ground! Vandalism? Far from it, in fact an act intended to manage the trees growth so that it would continue to produce an assortment of timber products for an almost infinite period of time to come. Product ranging from firewood to spindle legs for furniture, handles for tools and many others. The process is called POLLARDING, and along with its sister system, Coppicing, has been used to manage trees and woodland for timber products back so far into antiquity that no firm date has yet been put on their original use.

The systems are basically similar, in that the tops of trees are cut off and allowed to re-grow, and then the re-growth is again cut off, or harvested at regular intervals ranging from around 5 to 15 years, depending on the variety of tree, and the type of product wanted. The difference between the two systems is that in coppicing the tree is cut down essentially to ground level, whereas a pollard is cut off at between 6 and 8 feet above ground level. The reason for this being that it prevents the tender re-growth from being eaten by browsing animals such as cattle and deer, and for that reason it is most often employed in such places as deer parks and in the boundary hedges of grazing meadows. An interesting and useful side effect of both systems is that trees so treated live for a very long time. Often significantly longer than would be the case for a virgin tree of the same species, so that for example in Bradfield Wood there are coppiced Hazel stools, a shrub/tree with a normal life expectancy of perhaps two to three hundred years on average, which are thought to be in excess of one thousand years old. They were being harvested for timber before the Norman Conquest!

In the case of pollards, such was their permanence in the landscapes that they often became marker points in all type of boundaries, from those of farms and

estates, to parishes, manors and counties.

Down on Kiln Meadow our young pollard never achieved that level of fame. It did however continue to be harvested for around a hundred years, until the middle of the last century (that is the 20th century). Times had changed, the need for firewood and rustic timber products had gone, and often, sadly, so had the men who had practised the old skills. Our pollard was left, forgotten and neglected to grow as it would. Unfortunately, left to their own devices, neglected pollards quite rapidly (relatively speaking) destroy themselves. The rapid and vigorous re-growth which has been so valued, left uncut continues growing until it is far too large and heavy to be supported by the older trunk, which may have become hollow. One day there is a strong wind, the trunk cracks, and the whole tree may collapse radial fashion away from the centre.

Nation-wide there are moves being made to save these valuable old trees from self-destruction, and to restore them to their former glory. At time this process appears at first sight to be anything but beneficial. Trees which for as long as most people can remember, have been a much-loved part of the local landscape, are suddenly subjected to drastic surgery. Most or all of their tops are cut off, and they look as if they have been destroyed! For a month or two it looks terrible, a great open space where once there was a mass of branches. Then with the spring re-growth starts. In the first year the new branches may grow four feet. Within a year or two there is a great mass of foliage. A pollard has been reborn, and if it is maintained it may go on to live for another thousand years or more.

This is the process that has been started on the oak in Kiln Meadow. Some, but in this case not all of the upper branches have been removed, by a qualified tree surgeon. In a year or two, when the tree has got over the shock, and got back into the swing of producing new growth, the rest will be removed, and hopefully the process will then be repeated on a routine basis.

So with luck our oak, which may have been born during the Napoleonic Wars, perhaps originally intended to provide timber for the "Wooden Walls", which saw the rise of the railways, Queen Victoria's coronation and death, the first acroplanes, two world wars and men on the moon, will go on to see -?

Well, whatever the future holds.

PARISH COUNCIL

The February Ordinary Meeting of the Parish Council was attended by 26 members of the public. Our Correspondent noted the following matters of interest amongst those discussed.

Minutes: The Chairman ruled that letters which are read out in meetings at the request of Councillors do not form part of the Meetings and, therefore, do not have to be minuted. He agreed to sort out, 'back at the office,' the omission of the formal proposal and voting on the Precept which was set at the January meeting but not properly minuted. Three Councillors, therefore, voted against the acceptance of the Minutes as a true record.

BMX Track: A 27 name petition was presented on behalf of youngsters in the village keen to see a BMX or similar facility in the village.

Kiln Meadow Wildlife: A report was read by one of the volunteers who maintain the wildlife area at footpath 16 near Kiln Lane on behalf of the Council. It detailed extensive remedial tree works, including some relocations and the pollarding of an old oak. A seat has been offered for the site free of charge and the nest boxes have been prepared for the new season with considerable activity already recorded. The closed circuit television camera has been installed in a next box in anticipation of a new tenant.

Recycling Centre Licence: The necessary paperwork to allow the relocation of the recycling centre to the Industrial Estate behind the Fox was tabled but not signed. Concerns were expressed regarding the poor state of the road near to the new location at the junction with Station Road at the railway crossing.

County Council: A report was read out from County Councillor Gordon Iredale who lives in Sussex. It mentioned the re-organisation of Social Service, the fact that the Police Authority is still reachable via the County Council, Youth Justice Plans and the provision of Locality Funding for a project in Drinkstone. It was suggested that future reports be circulated to Councillors rather than read out in full.

Grants: Councillors agreed to grant aid the Little Elms Pre-School in the sum of some £230 and the Toddler Group some £369.

Communication: Widespread concern was voiced by Councillors regarding poor communication on the part of Council across a broad range of activities. The Website has not been updated since September and contains much wrong information. The last minutes were deposited at the Library in June 2000. Telephone communication with the Clerk is difficult and very hit-and-miss. Letters go unanswered and astray. One-to-one dealings with the public are often aggressive and unhelpful. There is a perception abroad that the Council is secretive and high handed. The reduction of the Agenda, Council Minutes and other supporting documentation to a minimalist level has lead to poor relations with the public who repeatedly asked, during the recent election campaign, that more information should be available. Having abandoned its monthly report in the village's Newsletter, the Council is without an official voice. Although new Freedom of Information legislation will eventually force a more open approach, it was argued that a positive and pro-active move now should be implemented to address these important issues as the Council is losing the PR war which it has begun against those it should be serving. A proposal from Cllr Ronald Curry that this body should meet in private was defeated. Three Councillors voted against the new body, but the proposal, from Cllr Mrs Mary Fceney, seconded by Cllr Doug Reed, was passed to the obvious satisfaction of the public present.

CCTV: Councillors decided not to actively pursue an initiative suggested by Mid Suffolk District Council which would make available a mobile closed circuit television facility in the District to be located at 'trouble hot spots' within Parishes on request.

Play Area: It was decided not to arrange for an opening ceremony at the Thedwastre Close Play Area in the light of the embarrassing condition of the site which is dangerously rutted, marred with spoil heaps and likely to remain underwater for many weeks. The builders have been paid in full. There was no money retained against poor workmanship or failure to complete the project. It was suggested that Council might review its procedures with regards to such contracts.

Street Cleaner: The Street Cleaner has recently resigned for unspecified reasons. The post is to be advertised.

Street Lights: In response to a letter from a resident and to comments made during recent election campaigning, Cllr Mrs Mary Feeney expressed her astonishment that a professional street lighting survey had suggested that 5 new lights in Bennett Avenue are a priority, given the overall lighting situation

in the village. The implementation of the proposals is delayed for want of a contract price.

Appraisal: Councillors noted a number of areas highlighted in an 'Action Plan' put forward by the group which recently carried out a Village Appraisal. No further action was scheduled.

Anonymous Leaflet: The Chairman defended his decision to place on the agenda and read to the Meeting an anonymous pamphlet regarding the development of the Amenities Association Trust Property at Cooks Road. He denied that this was motivated by malevolence.

Planning: Five planning applications have been received. These may be the subject of discussion at a future meeting.

Blackbourne Management Association: A proposal to look again at the structure of the body which has been set up by the Council to administer Blackbourne and which has been the subject of considerable public criticism was defeated by 6 votes to 3.

Luncheon Club: There was considerable discussion on a proposal from Cllr Mrs Mary Feeney which sought to draw a line under the long running problems between the Council and the Luncheon Club which had arisen when the rates for the Club's use of Blackbourne had been dramatically increased. The Club now meets out of the village but is being pressed by the Parish Clerk for the return of some grant aid made to it as a Blackbourne tenant. The Chairman conceded that the wording of the Council's proposal relating to the original grant was so poor as to be open to a wide and confusing interpretation. Cllr Mrs Feeney's case was that there was an opportunity to 'bridge building' to begin. Her proposal that the Parish Council require no refund of grant made to the Luncheon Club succeeded very narrowly.

Fraud Squad: An item for discussion, placed on the agenda by a Councillor, sought to open up the vexed question of the Council's involvement, or that of individual Councillors, in the recent Suffolk Constabulary Fraud Squad's raid on the Trustees of the Amenities Association. The Chairman, Cllr David Marriott, who is in contact with the Officer leading the investigation, refused to allow discussion to proceed.

Information for Councillors: A member of the public, herself a Parish Councillor, observed that Councillors seem very poorly briefed on matters

which come before them and that the Clerk might provide more background documentation towards meaningful and informed discussion.

School Road Flooding: Cllr Burch pointed out that, once again, the many potholes around the village are posing serious hazards. He looked forward to the election of a new County Councillor who might be persuaded to stay in the area and be on hand to progress such matters.

Next Meeting: The date of the next Ordinary Meeting was agreed as Monday 12th March at 7.30 at Blackbourne.
